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Your Vestry met twice during the month of March, once in early March for our Annual Retreat (before the CDC COVID19 restrictions for gathering were put in place), and subsequently (virtually) for our regular Monthly meeting. No one then anticipated the escalation of defensive and isolation measures that we have seen in our country over the last several weeks.

Whether it was just happenstance or our Lord stepping in, one of the primary areas of focus for both Vestry meetings is expanding opportunities to enhance each member of the Vestry's communication with our church Ministries and congregation. As we all have been reminded over the last several weeks, communication during these times is critical to maintaining and supporting our church family.

For a parish our size, we are blessed with a high number of Missions and Ministries. The Vestry will ensure that we have open communications with all of our Missions and Ministries to reinforce their importance to our parish, promote their accomplishments, and addressing any needs that may arise. Each Vestry member is assigned as a Liaison to Ministry leaders of the parish and are asked to reach out to them regularly. Other ways we are staying connected include our Phone Tree volunteers, who have been calling parishioners to check up on them, asking how they are doing and whether they are in need of help. We also regularly post updates on social media and by email.

The Vestry also reviewed the finances of the church. Through the end of February our financial position was strong. However, knowing that income is now down because we are not gathering in person, the Vestry is asking that all spending, including operating and capital expenditures, be reviewed and deferred where necessary. In accordance with the CDC Guidelines, the Furniture Thrift Store and Little Thrift Store are also closed. During this time of unprecedented change, we have been very impressed with the creativity, flexibility and capabilities of the parish's lay staff. They turned on a dime to increase and improve our technological capabilities, shift resources, batten down the campus, manage communication with outside groups, facilitate necessary changes in the worship services, and do whatever tasks and projects Becky and the Vestry have asked them to do. They are a true support team, and we are grateful for their hard work.

The Vestry's emphasis continues on our church and congregation. We are blessed with church members who remain in good communication with each other and stay committed to supporting each other. This forms us as a community of faith. We are the church, and we are ready for whatever next step comes before us. The members of your Vestry trust God, each other, and the members of this parish family, and we are confident that the best is yet to come.
