



Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet!

Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways,
as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness

THE SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 2:1-12

Lector *The Second Reading is taken from 1st Corinthians chapter 2...*

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written,

“What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived,
what God has prepared for those who love him”—

these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God.

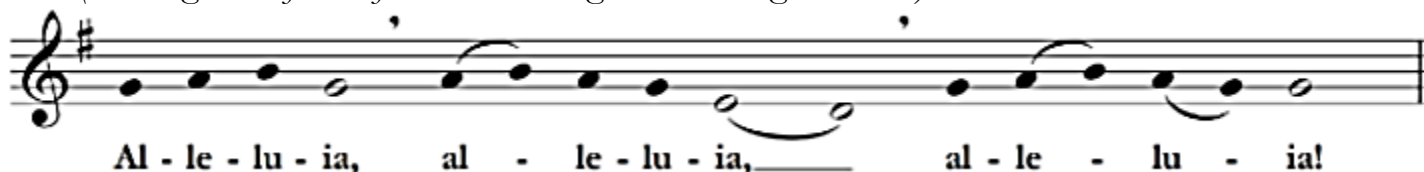

Matthew 5:13-20

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Celebrant Jesus said, “You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

COMMISSIONED ANTHEM BY LLOYD LARSON

As the anniversary committee thought last summer of ways to celebrate the significant milestone of 140 years, one thought was to have a unique choir anthem composed for the occasion. It was ultimately decided that the distinguished and renowned composer Lloyd Larson would be asked and he accepted the commission.

For over 30 years, Larson has been an active composer and arranger for several major publishing companies of church and school music. His compositions number well over 1300 published works including choral anthems, numerous extended Christmas and Easter works, keyboard collections, instrumental works, handbell pieces and more.

He is married and has three children and four grandchildren. He makes his home in the Minneapolis, MN area. Lloyd writes, "I am delighted...and honored to be able to partner with you and your church community in celebrating your anniversary on February 8."

He has written both the text and the music and based it on Psalm 90. Scored for four-part voices, trumpet and organ, it comes to a grand finish as we all sing two stanzas of Isaac Watts' famous hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past." Many thanks to all who contributed to make this a reality.
