Knowing Bob Moncrief by Judy Warner Vestry Member

As a new Vestry member I was asked to write an article for the Vestry Voice about something I care for deeply. Based on my love of music, I asked our Music Director, Bob Moncrief, for an interview.

Before coming to us, Bob had an illustrious musical career. He spent 40 years in 3 large churches in 3 different states – NY, Michigan and Ohio. He was involved in planning music for worship for adult choirs, children's choirs, and handbell choirs. At his first church, when he was still in his 20's, he is proud to say that he was responsible for the design and installation of a 50-stop, 68-rank Casavant organ that is to this day considered by many the best organ in the NYC area. He said, "I made an impact that will outlive me."

Bob did his undergrad music work at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA. While there, he became a member and was assistant organist at Bruton Parish Church, an Episcopal church founded in 1716. While attending college there, he performed many organ recitals at Bruton Parish.

Yale School of Music is where Bob landed to do his graduate studies in organ and sacred music. He was a member of the first class of Yale Institute of Sacred Music. While at Yale, Bob did private study in organ, conducting, and voice. While at Yale, he conducted the choir at Yale Divinity School and assisted his organ professor at First Presbyterian Church, 5<sup>th</sup> Ave, NYC.

A fun note! Many of you may know the Rev. Randy Hehr. He and Bob were in the same graduate program while at Yale. What a small world!

Bob became known for his stellar tenor voice. His agent sent him throughout NY to sing solos in oratorios with orchestra. After one performance in Albany, NY, the review stated that he was "the one shining light." One of his most memorable experiences was singing the tenor solos for Handel's *Messiah* in the Troy, NY concert hall. As he sang the Passion section, he looked out and up front and saw a whole row of nuns crying. He was deeply touched to see that he had moved those people.

In his life as an organist, Bob was invited to perform many organ recitals mainly in churches throughout the country including several in NYC, Washington DC, Cleveland, Detroit, New Haven, and Chicago.

Having been with us for 3 years now he reports that he loves living in the Tampa Bay area. He loves our church, the people, the staff and working regularly with our choir. He really likes playing our organ. Bob finds it meaningful that he ended up at Church of the Good Shepherd because the Good Shepherd image was always a very special image to him. He told Becky how much he likes working with her and calls her his "reward" of a boss

There are many hobbies that are of interest to Bob outside of music. He enjoys gardening, antiques, cooking, travel and going to the beach.

It was my pleasure learning more about our esteemed Music Director. I'm sure I speak for all of us when I say: WE ARE TRULY BLESSED BY YOUR TALENTS, Bob! THANK YOU and please keep shining your light among us.
